UNMC NOTES:

Four UNMC colleges or programs were listed in the U.S. News & World Report's ranking of **America's Best Graduate Schools 2009**, including the College of Medicine's primary care and rural health programs, which were both ranked in the top 20.

In 2009, UNMC's extramural **research support exceeded \$100 million** for the first time. With their eye on the future, UNMC medical scientists work to solve health care's biggest challenges. Many of them collaborate in the state-of-the-art **Durham Research Center** and **Durham Research Center II**. Construction on these facilities – \$77 million and \$76.5 million, respectively – was funded primarily through private giving.

Nearly half of **Nebraska's physicians, dental professionals, pharmacists, bachelor-prepared nurses** and **allied health professionals** have graduated from UNMC.

To further academic excellence, UNMC opened the \$52.7 million **Michael F. Sorrell Center for Health Science Education** in 2008. The Sorrell Center replaced obsolete facilities with technologically equipped classrooms and class laboratories, including clinical simulation rooms, interaction rooms, amphitheaters and a campus events center. Construction of the Sorrell Center was funded completely through private donations.

In January 2007, UNMC added a **College of Public Health** to its academic enterprise. This College addresses a variety of issues facing Nebraska, including health promotion and disease prevention, environmental health and safety, health care delivery and biosecurity and biopreparedness. In 2010, the **Harold M. and Beverly Maurer Center for Public Health** will open. This 52,500-square-foot facility will house the College.

Also slated for completion in 2010 are:

The **Home Instead Center for Successful Aging**. This two-level center will increase clinical and translational research by establishing an appropriate environment for conducting clinical trials for Alzheimer's disease and other geriatric-specific disorders.

The **Center for College of Nursing Sciences**. The 43,000-square-foot building will enable the college to enroll more nursing students and prepare more nurse faculty.
