Executive Summary on the Economic Impact of Health Care Sector

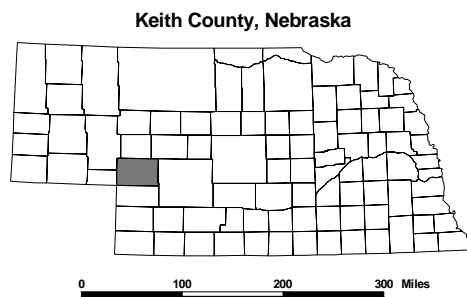
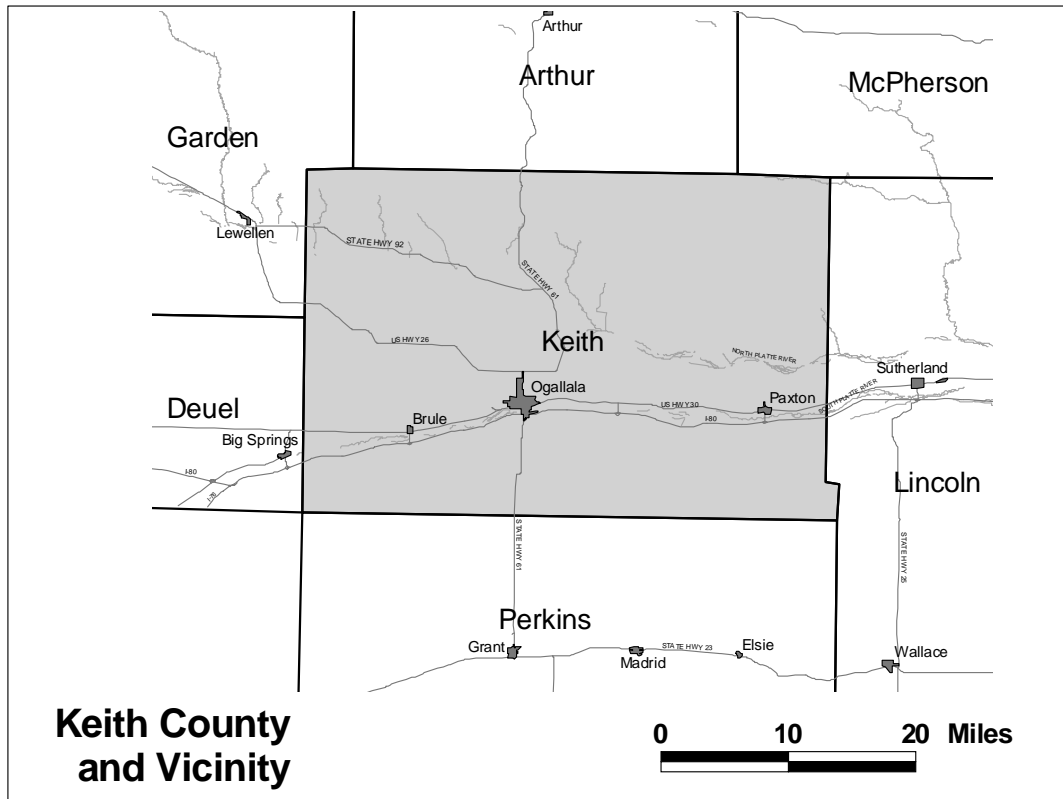
- ◆ One job created in the health care sector of Keith County would lead to the creation of another 0.40 job in other sectors of the county's economy.
- ◆ One dollar of income earned in the health care sector of Keith County would lead to another \$0.30 of income earned in other sectors of the county's economy.
- ◆ One dollar spent in the health care sector of Keith County would lead to another \$0.44 spent in other sectors of the county's economy.
- ◆ The overall job creation due to health care (directly and indirectly) in Keith County is estimated at 738 jobs, which accounts for 13.42% of the county's total employment.
- ◆ The overall income earned due to health care (directly and indirectly) in Keith County is estimated at \$20.1 million, which accounts for 15.76% of the county's total income.
- ◆ The overall spending due to health care (directly and indirectly) in Keith County is estimated at \$41.9 million, which accounts for 8.73% of the county's total economic output.

I. GEOGRAPHY

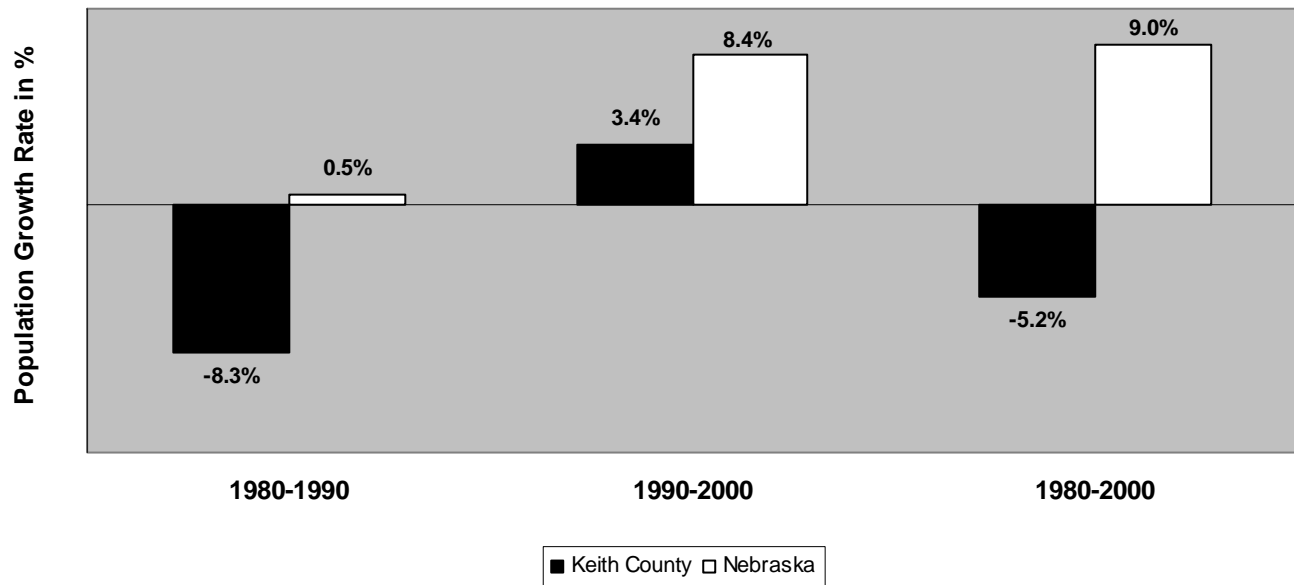
Keith County is located near the west-central area of Nebraska. The county has a total of 1,110 square miles with a population density of 8.0 people per square mile (Nebraska: 22.3 per square mile). The county seat of Keith County is Ogallala, Nebraska.



II. POPULATION

The population for Keith County was 8,875 in 2000. The county has experienced a negative population change of -5.2% (compared to +9.0% statewide) during 1980-2000 (Figure 1). Although the county's minority population has increased during the last decade, white (non-Hispanic) people still represented the great majority of Keith County's population in 2000 (96.8% vs. 89.6% statewide, Table 1). In addition, the county's population is older than the state's, with the elderly (aged 65+) representing 18.4% (compared to 13.6% statewide) of the population in 2000 (Table 2).

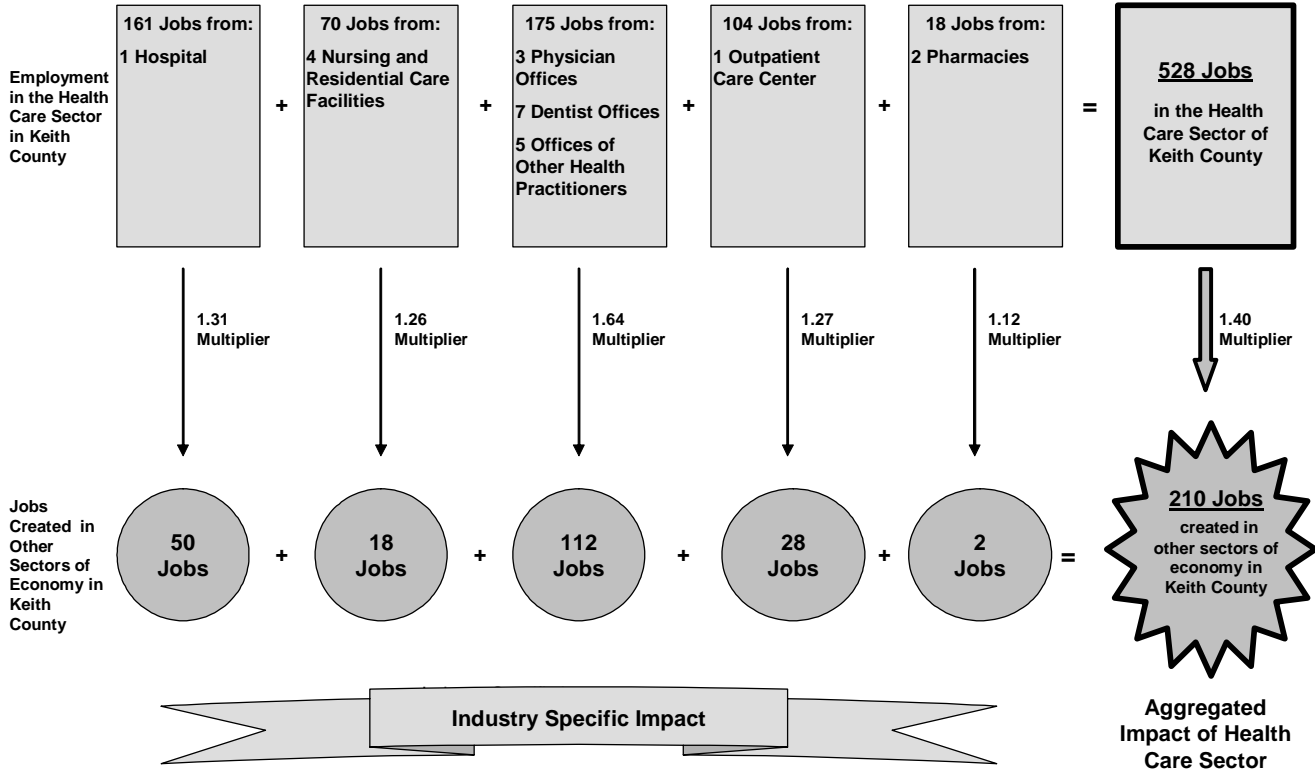

III. ECONOMIC IMPACT OF THE HEALTH CARE SECTOR

The retail trade is the largest employer within Keith County, followed by accommodation and food services, health care and social assistance, manufacturing, and wholesale trade. The Health Care sector of Keith County includes one hospital, four nursing and residential care facilities, three physician offices, seven dentist offices, five offices of other health practitioners, one outpatient care facility, and two pharmacies.

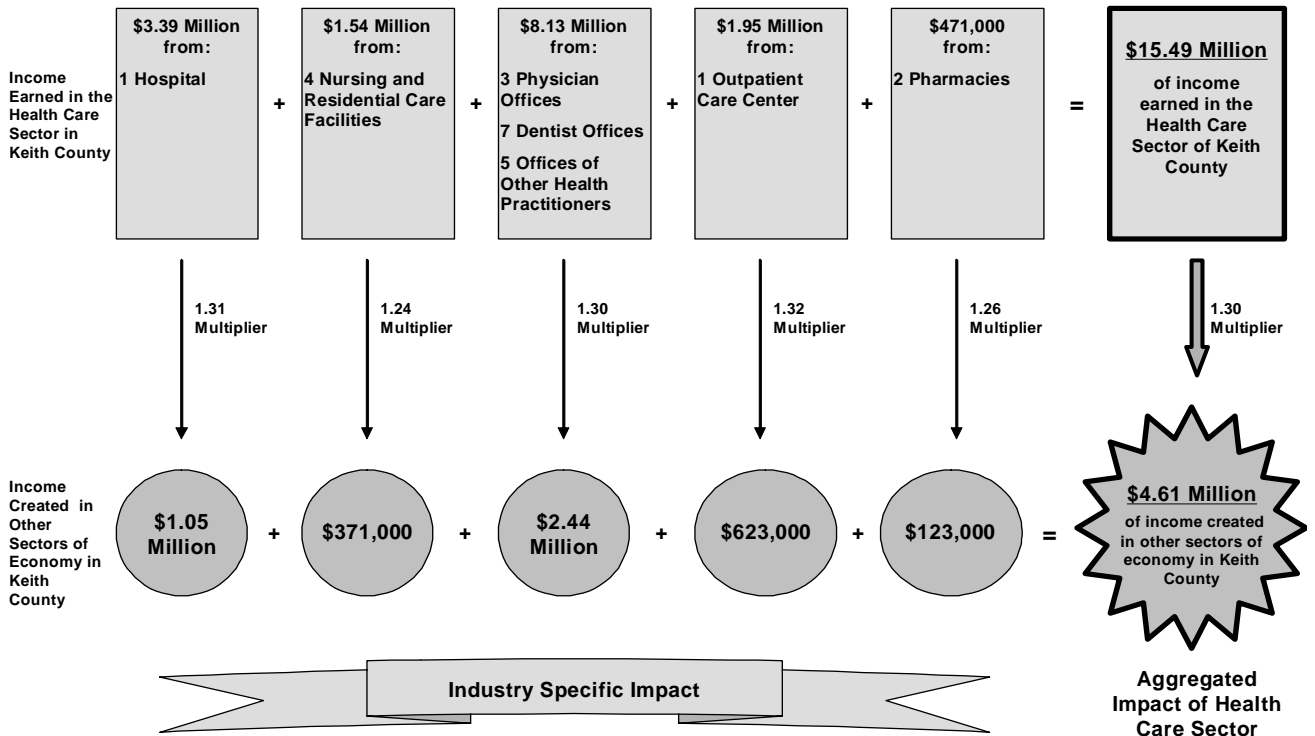
- ◆ The 528 jobs in the health care sector of Keith County have created (through a 1.40 multiplier) another 210 jobs in other sectors of the county's economy (Figure 2). Therefore, the combined effect represents 13.42% of the county's total employment (i.e., 738 out of 5,501 jobs).
- ◆ The \$15.5 million of income earned in the health care sector of Keith County has created (through a 1.30 multiplier) another \$4.6 million of income in other sectors of the county's economy (Figure 3). Therefore, the combined effect represents 15.76% of the county's total income (i.e., \$20.1 million out of \$127.5 million).
- ◆ The \$29.2 million spent in the health care sector of Keith County has created (through a 1.44 multiplier) another \$12.7 million of spending in other sectors of the county's economy (Figure 4). Therefore, the combined effect represents 8.73% of the county's total economic output (i.e., \$41.9 million out of \$479.7 million).

Figure 2. The Economic Impact of the Health Care Sector on Employment in Keith County, Nebraska



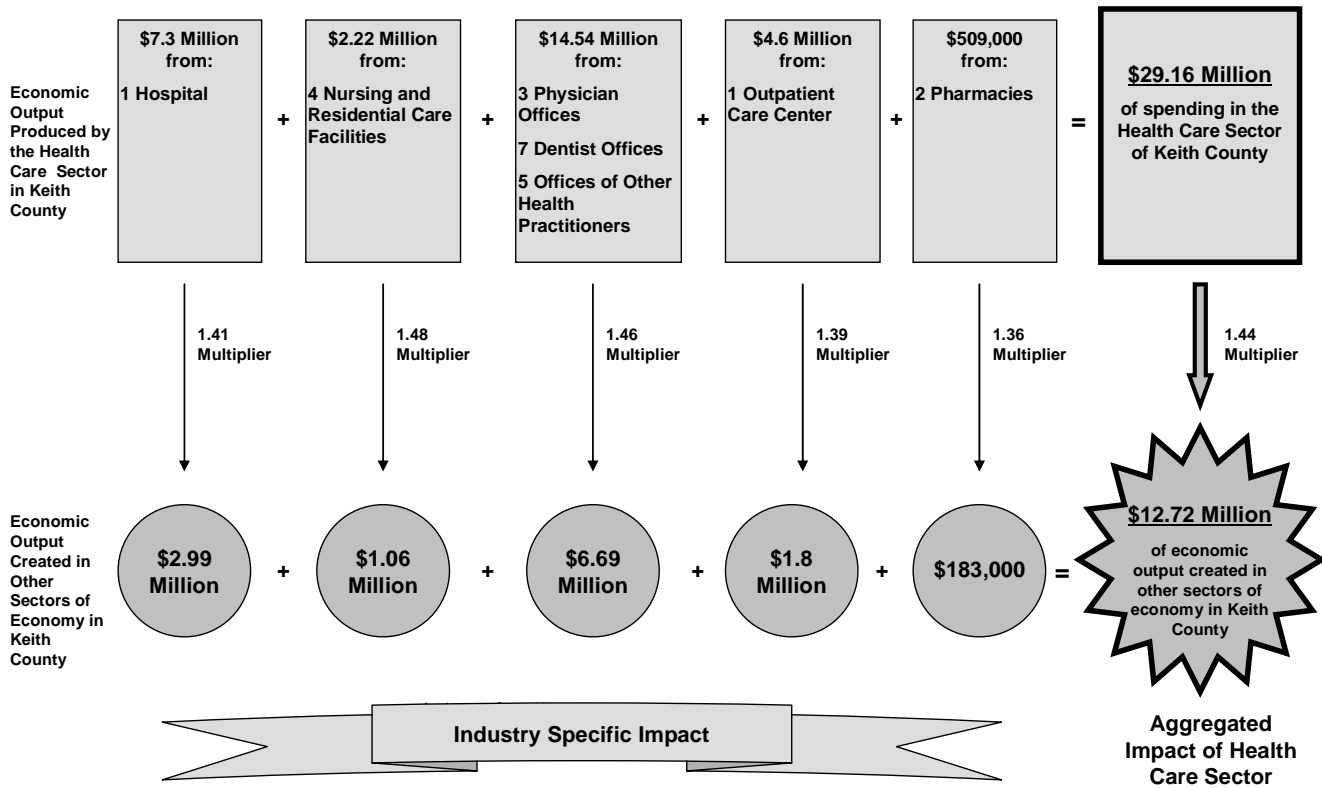

Figure 4. The Impact of the Health Care Sector on Economic Output in Keith County, Nebraska

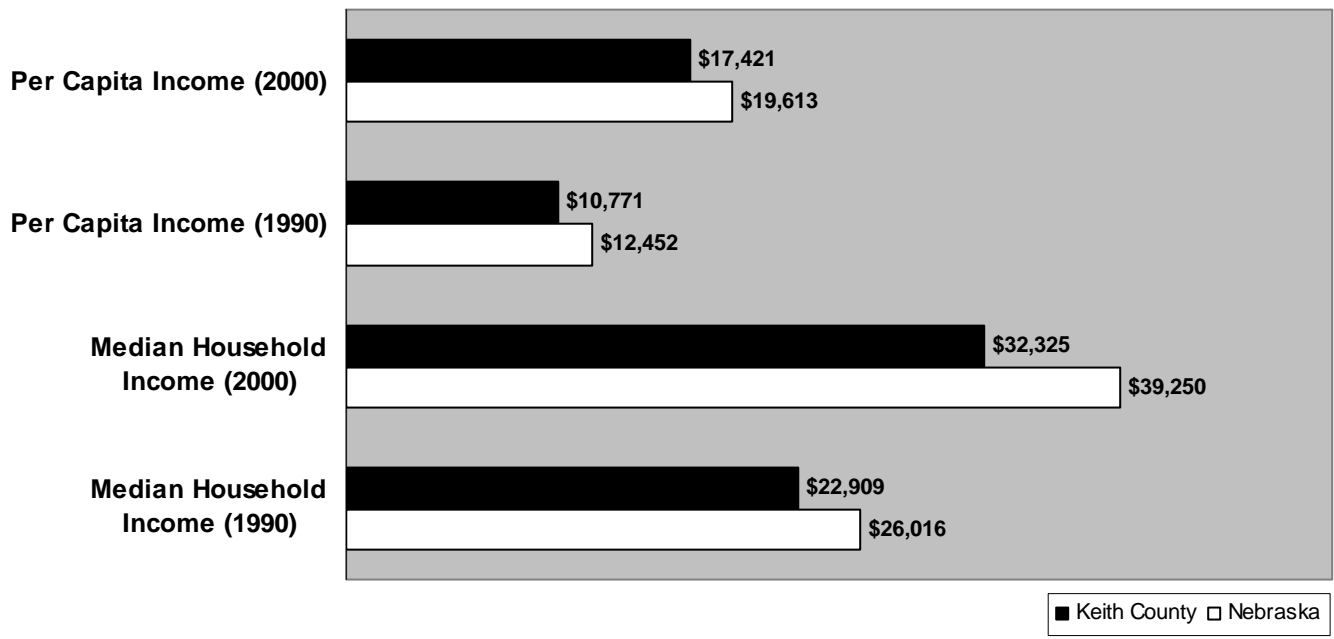

IV. SOCIO-ECONOMIC INDICATORS

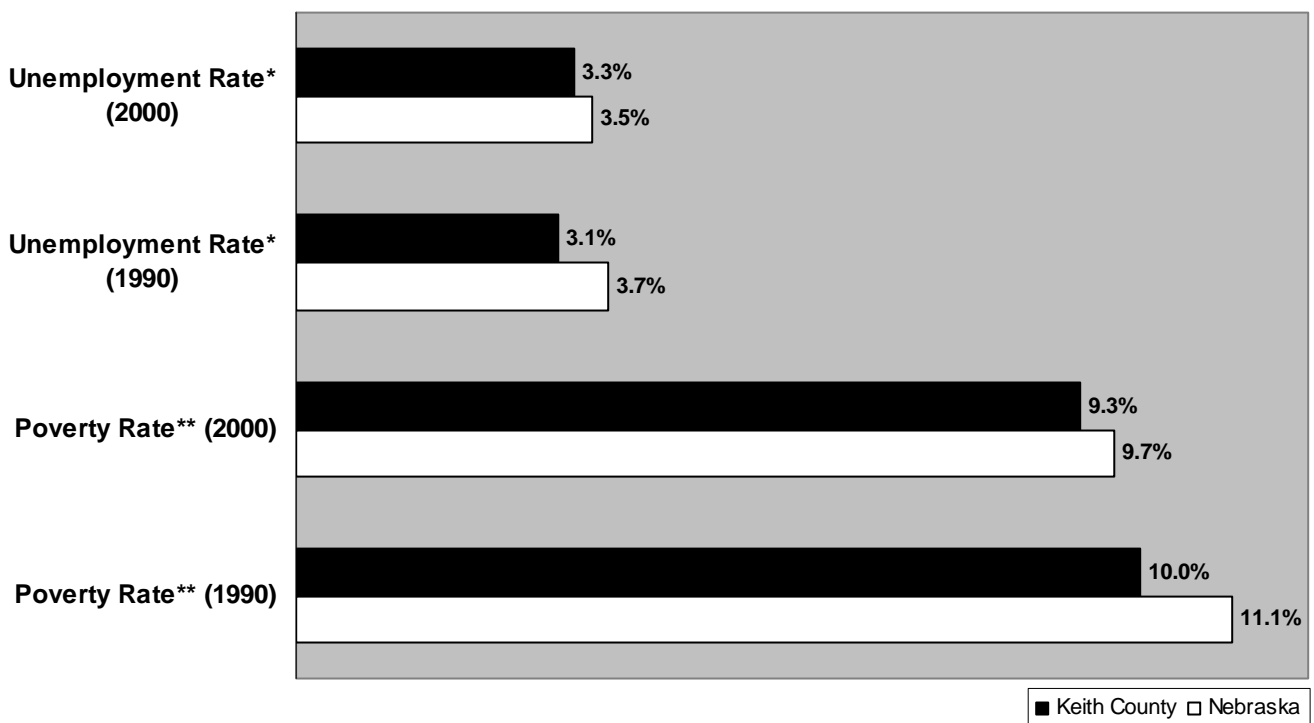
The median household income of the county has increased since 1990 by 41.1% to \$32,325 in 2000 (compared to \$39,250 statewide), and the per capita income of the county has increased since 1990 by 61.7% to \$17,421 in 2000 (compared to \$19,613 statewide) (Figure 5). Keith County experienced a lower unemployment rate (3.3% vs. 3.5% statewide) and poverty rate (9.3% vs. 9.7% statewide) than the state in 2000 (Figure 6). Moreover, the county out-performed the state in two of the social indicators shown in Table 3, while having a higher percentage of first births born to unmarried women, younger than 20, with less than a high school education.

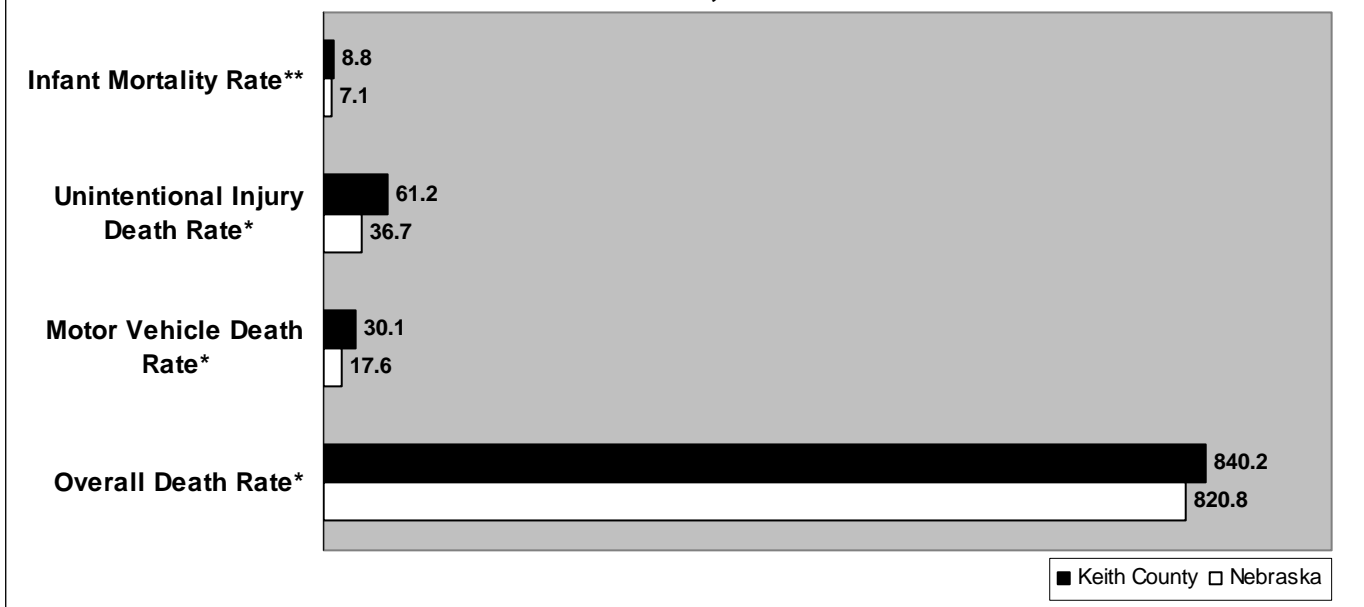

V. HEALTH STATUS INDICATORS

The residents of Keith County had higher mortality rates for infants, unintentional injuries, motor vehicle accidents and overall deaths compared with the state between 1997 and 2001 (Figure 7). Comparing maternal and child health indicators, Keith County had a higher rate of low-weight births, percent of births to adolescents aged 10-17, and percent of pregnant women who smoked, shown in Figure 8. Among the top 5 leading causes of death of Keith County residents, the county had a lower mortality rate than the state for cancer, cerebrovascular disease, and chronic lung disease (Figure 9). Among the top 5 leading causes of hospitalization of Keith County residents between 1999 and 2000, the county has a higher hospitalization rate than the state for digestive and genitourinary diseases (Figure 10).

Figure 7. Selected Mortality Rates for Keith County and Nebraska, 1997-2001

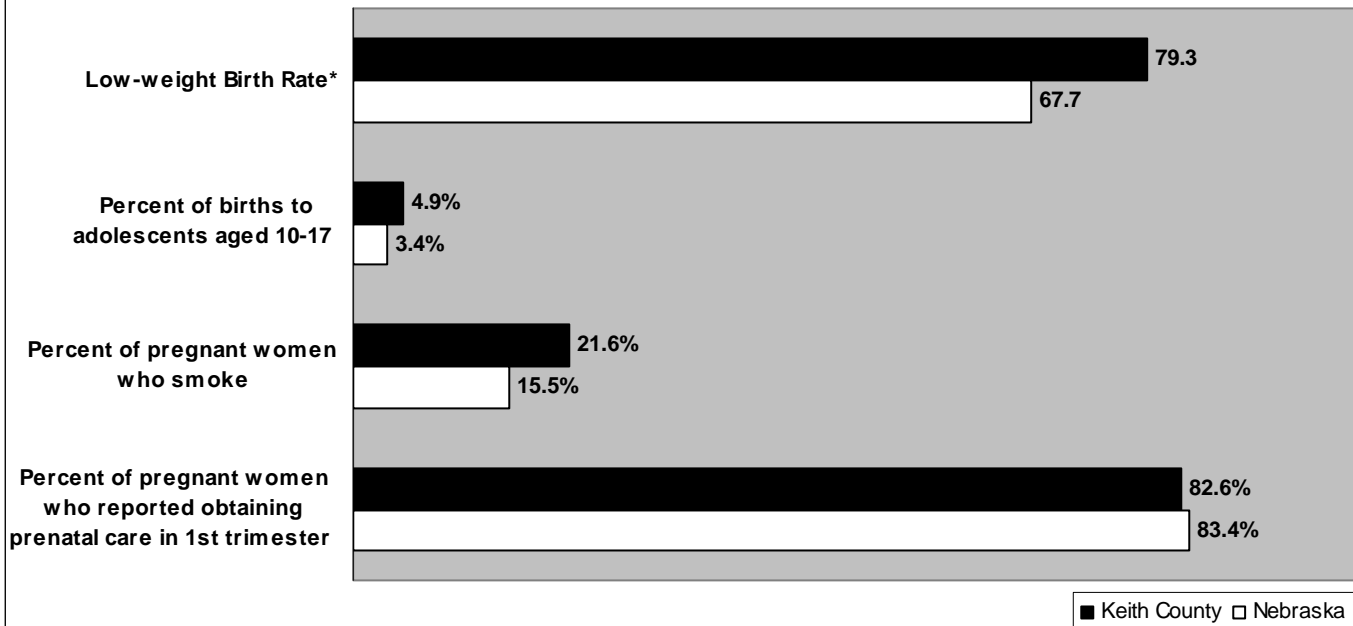

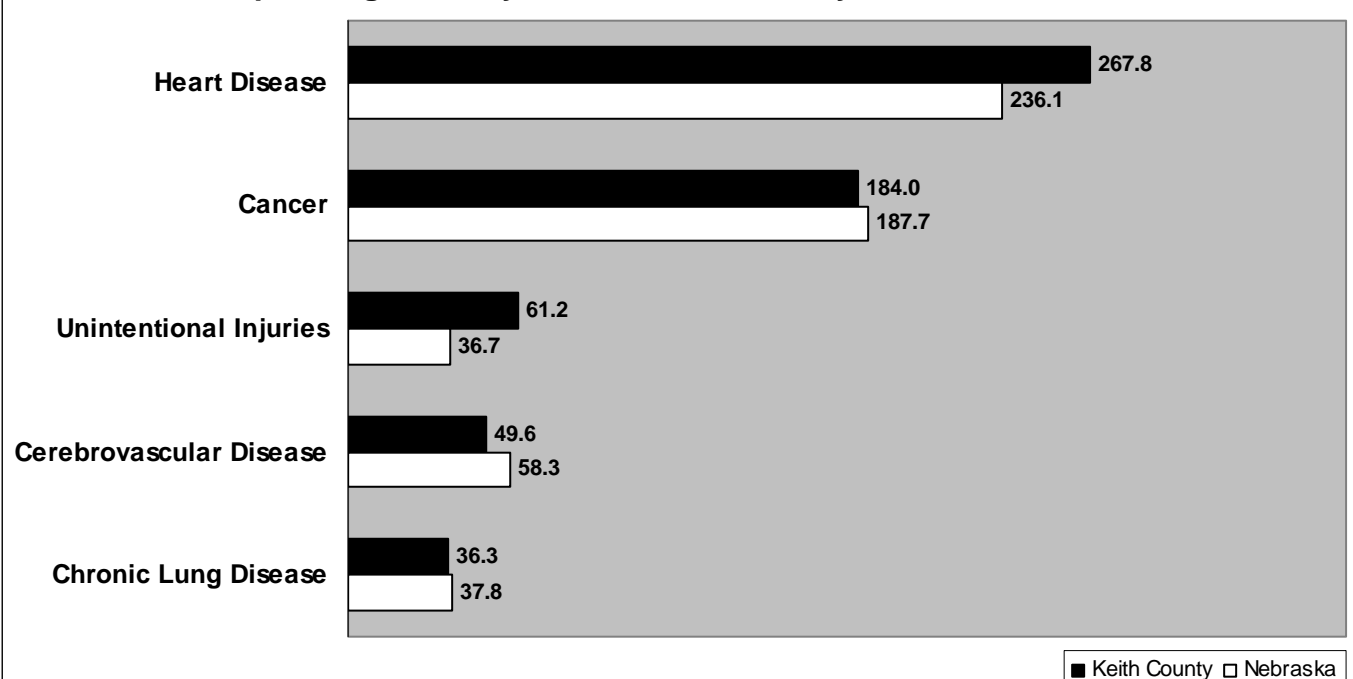

Figure 8. Selected Maternal and Child Health Indicators, Keith County and Nebraska, 1997-2001



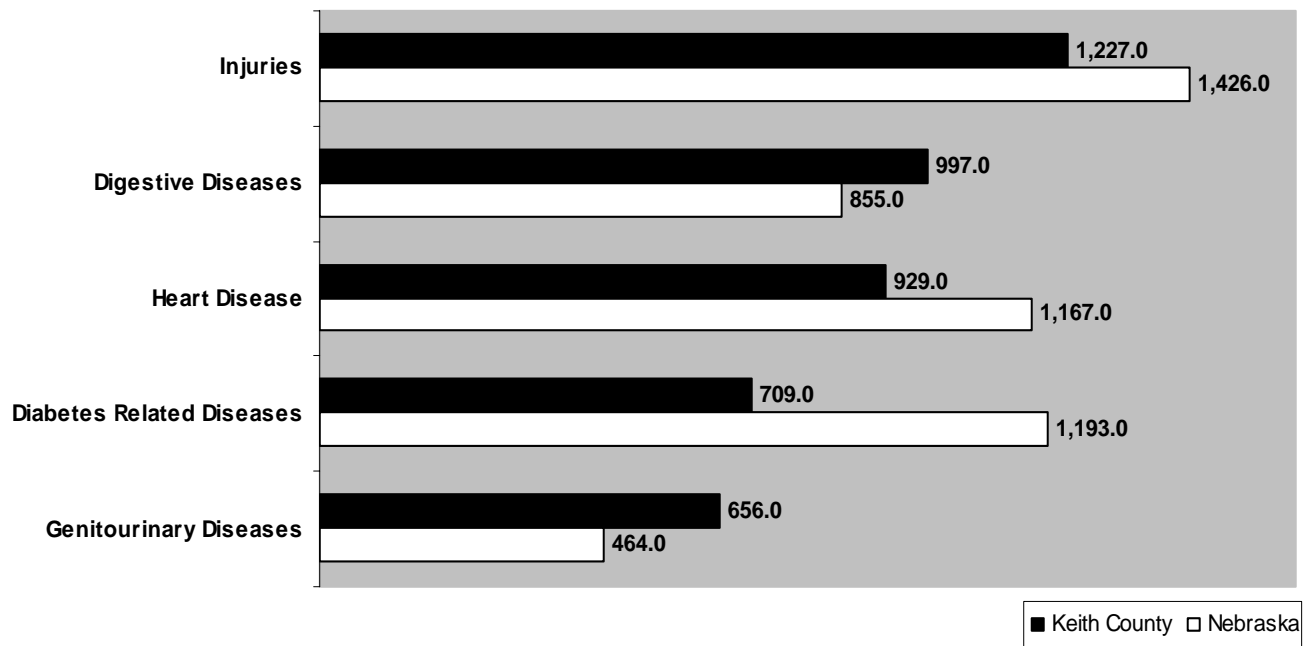

**Defined as the proportion of inpatient hospital discharges to a population within clearly specified geographic boundaries, age adjusted per 100,000 population.

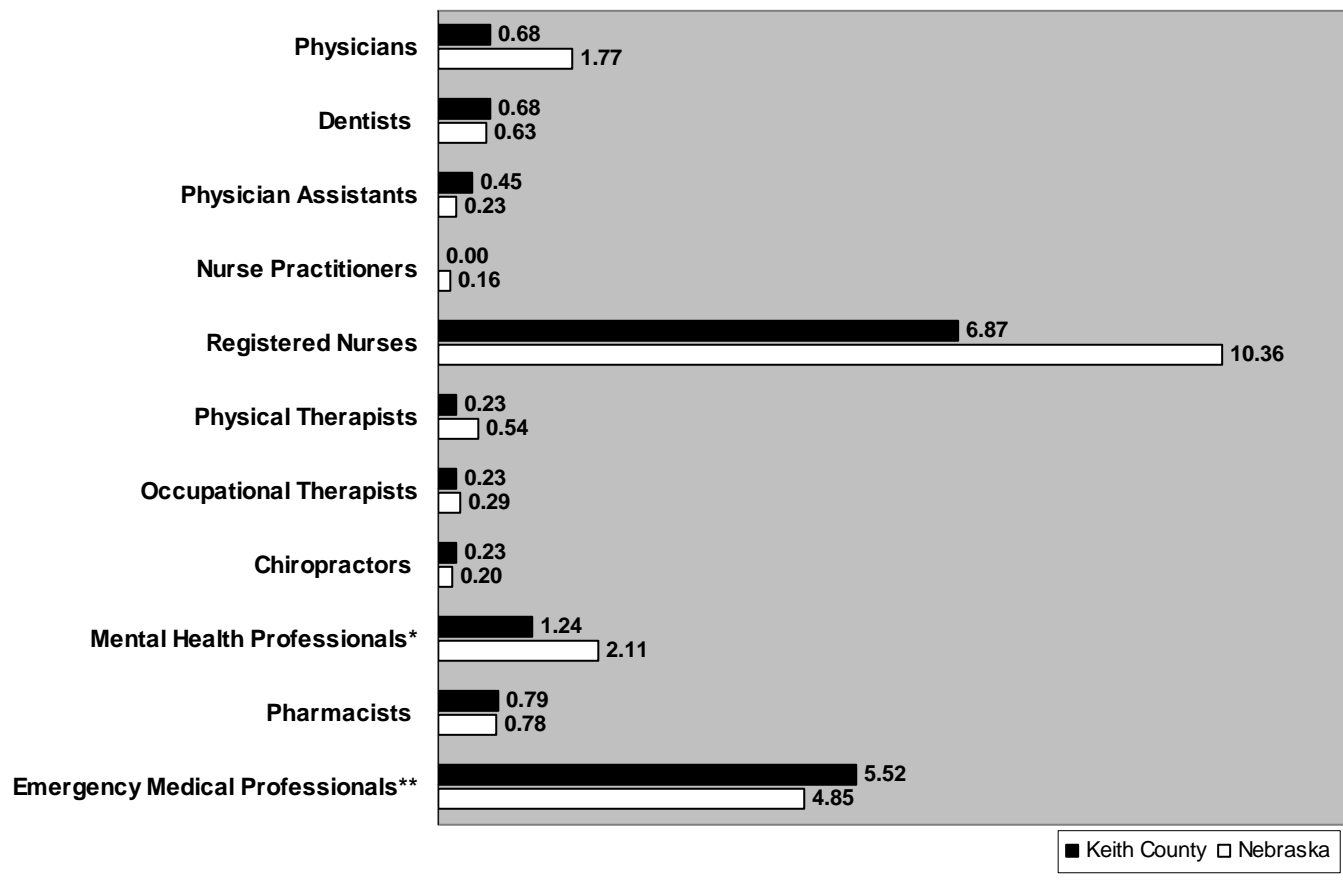

VI. HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS

Keith County is federally designated as a mental health professional shortage area. The state government has designated Keith County as a health professional shortage area in the specialties of family practice, internal medicine, pediatrics, OB/GYN, psychiatry, and occupational therapy.

Keith County has a higher professional-to-population ratio than the state for dentists, physician assistants, chiropractors, pharmacists, and EMS professionals. The county has a lower ratio for physicians, nurse practitioners, registered nurses, physical therapists, and mental health professionals shown in Figure 11.

VII. HOSPITAL AND LONG-TERM CARE BEDS

Table 4 shows that Keith County's hospital and its long-term care industry have lower bed-to-population ratios than the state. As a result, the need for hospital inpatient care for the general public and long-term care may not be well met within the county.

Data Notes

Using IMPLAN software and IMPLAN data for Nebraska's five health-related economic subsectors, we predict changes in overall economic activity as a result of change in health care subsectors. The IMPLAN software is based on an economic input-output model. To improve the accuracy of the dataset in order to better estimate health sector impact, we also use information from the U.S. Census Bureau's *County Business Patterns 2004* and the *American Hospital Association Annual Survey Database: Fiscal Year 2006*. Analysis is only performed at the county level.
