Contacting Your Senator

Know them before you need them – Meet for an introduction outside of session or invite them to tour your agency

PHONE

- ① Introduce yourself
- Let the staff person know you are a constituent
- discuss

PERSONAL MEETINGS

- Call the office to request a meeting
- Attend any public meetings held by the senator

EMAILS


- Be respectful and concise
- ① Include your name and contact information
- DO NOT use scripted emails; use your own words
- Don't expect an immediate response

LETTERS


Focus on your main points but go into greater detail than you would in an email

GUIDELINES

- Always speak to senators and their staff politely and with respect
- Understand there are many demands on the senators' time, and they may not be able to speak to your issue immediately
- Senators' families sacrifice a great deal to support their family member please refrain from confronting them regarding legislative business, votes, or actions of their family member

Testifying In Committee

- Testimony is accepted as Proponents, Opponents, Neutral (in this order)
- (NOT REQUIRED) If you bring handouts of your testimony, be sure to have 12-15 copies
- Fill out a Testifier sheet prior to your testimony and hand to the Committee Clerk or Page as you come to the Testifiers Table
- Most Committees use the light system; be prepared to limit testimony to 3 to 5 minutes

- Committee members may ask questions after your testimony
- Letters may be submitted for the official record; email or deliver to committee chair by 8 a.m. on the day of the bill hearing (include your name, address, your position) and request that your letter is included as part of the public hearing record. ADVOCACY TOPICS

Compose an email or develop an "elevator speech" (short 2-3 minute introduction that will get your listener engaged and asking more questions) for one of the following topics

PROVIDER RATES – Behavioral Health provider rates have always been low and because so many providers receive the bulk of their revenues from public payers like Medicaid and Division of Behavioral Health going before the legislature's Appropriations Committee requesting an increase in an annual event.

AUDITS – Recently providers have been experiencing an increase in Medicaid/MCO audits resulting is significant financial clawbacks and hardships for providers. LB 381 was introduced to clean up and improve the audit process to make it less onerous for providers. Revises the requirements for program integrity audits and recovery audit contractors. Requires that contractors provide clear justifications for audits, limits the time frame for reviewing claims, and ensures that providers are notified of adverse determinations with detailed explanations. Establishes a framework for appealing audit decisions. Prohibits the recovery of payments in certain circumstances, such as when prior authorization was obtained for services rendered.

SAFE SYRINGE – Last year legislation was passed but vetoed that would allow local governments to establish a safe syringe program. The bill was reintroduced this session

Programs would provide essential services such as access to sterile syringes, safe disposal of used syringes, and educational resources on substance use disorder. These programs are designed to operate within specific guidelines, including a minimum distance from certain public facilities and restrictions on service provision to individuals under 18. The act also amends existing laws to provide exceptions for staff and participants of these programs regarding penalties related to drug paraphernalia.

FEDERAL BUDGET CONCERNS REGARDING CUTS OR CHANGES TO MEDICAID.

Congress is looking for ways to trim the federal budget and that could include cuts of \$880 million dollars to Medicaid services. Among the changes for consideration are implementing work requirements, reducing the federal match rate, and requiring eligibility determinations every 6 months instead of 12 months.
