In June the UNMC Department of Otolaryngology celebrated its 50th anniversary. The department was formed in 1968 when the University of Nebraska and Omaha University merged, creating the new Nebraska University system. Before 1968, the Omaha campus of the College of Medicine was part of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The Department of Otolaryngology was formed by Dr. Thomas Yarington with one physician and four volunteers. In the 50 years since the founding of the department, it has grown to 13 physicians, along with numerous support staff.

The department has grown from General ENT doctors to have ten subspecialties that include audiology, laryngology, facial plastic and reconstructive surgery, head and neck oncology, neuro-otology, oral and maxillofacial prosthetics, rhinology and pediatric ENT. Our newest physicians come from highly regarded Fellowship programs, and add more expertise to a thriving department. Dr. Hatch noted, "As a resident, I experienced the world class education provided by the University of Nebraska Medical Center. After I

completed my fellowship, I chose to return as a faculty member to provide that same excellent education to our current and future residents as the reason for joining the department.

Resident Update

We are thrilled to share the exciting changes in store for the Otolaryngology–Head & Neck Surgery Residency Program at the University of Nebraska Medical Center. The 2017-2018 academic year is one of incredible growth and expansion. We have matched our second three resident intern class after our approved increase by the ACGME last year. The changes last year to the otolaryngology curriculum allow our interns to delve into six months of ENT training, we are seeing great results with this welcomed change.

Our curriculum continues to evolve with stimulating internal and invited guest speakers, and several new multidisciplinary journal clubs. New this year will be an advanced patient simulation session designed to improve resident skills in delivering bad news and addressing patient challenges. Additionally we have standardized our mock oral boards curriculum to enhance the resident experience and to simulate more closely the actual event.

Again this year we will be offering several key resident courses including our annual head and neck anatomy cadaveric course, pediatric and adult airway course, temporal bone course, basic sinus surgery course, and our head and neck ultrasound course. We hope to work closely in the coming year with the members of our new Michael F. Sorrell Clinical Simulation laboratory to further enhance the training experience of our residents, when their new facilities open this spring. This new-state-of-the-art simulation center will allow our department to expand our courses to the regional and national programs and will allow a richer experience for the participants.

We have been working diligently to further build on our research infrastructure and will see a plethora of activity on this front this year due to the leadership of Dr. Jayme Dowdall, our new laryngologist who brings a wealth of research experience from Bringham Women's Hospital. Several new and exciting clinical and research collaborations with emergency medicine and neurological sciences are in the works that will further our research prowess. The combined resources of these partner departments will lead to fruitful research endeavors.

The enthusiasm this year for education and self-directed learning is palpable this year. This is in part due to our current chief residents who have helped foster a culture of learning. We are excited for what this year holds and can't wait to report all that we have accomplished.

We continue to work towards our goal of providing exceptional nationally recognized resident training and look forward to continued work towards this mission.




Teacher of the Year

Brain Leak

A story featuring one of our patients received worldwide attention this summer, appearing on television stations across the country and on websites around the globe. For years, Kendra Jackson was told she had allergies. But after seeing Physician Assistant Carla Schneider, she was diagnosed with a cerebrospinal fluid (CSF) leak, caused by a small hole in the thin bone that separates her brain and nasal cavities. CSF leaks are fairly uncommon, happening in about five in every 100,000 people worldwide each year.

The CSF leak was believed to have been caused by a car accident Jackson was involved in five years ago. The fluid leaked out of her nose on a nearly continuous basis, causing her to lose about a half-liter of fluid every day. It also caused severe migraine headaches. On April 23, rhinologist Christie Barnes, MD, and neurosurgeon Dan Surdell, MD, repaired the leak in a fairly brief surgery, using tissue from her abdomen to plug the hole.

The story was initially covered by Omaha television station KETV on May 4. Since then, it has appeared on about 100 local television stations nationwide and on around 700 different websites around the world, including Yahoo, The Washington Post, USA Today, Fox News, NPR, CBS and CNN. The potential internet audience for the story is approaching 1 billion people. Dr. Barnes and Ms. Jackson appeared on the Today show on May 31, 2018.

"I never slept. I was like a walking zombie. I would be up all night. And when I finally dozed off, it felt like I was drowning in the fluid draining in the back of my throat. So

I would sleep sitting up a lot of the times. Then when I did doze off and get a good sleep, when I wake up, my pillow would be soaked. My clothes would be soaked. The sheets would be soaked. That's when I knew it wasn't my allergies," she said.

"We went through the nostrils, through the nose," Barnes said, explaining that a team of doctors used Jackson's own tissue as a plug to prevent fluid from spilling out. "We use angled cameras, angled instruments to get us up to where we need to go."

Jackson was thrilled when the procedure was over. Her head felt clear.

"I don't have to carry around the tissue anymore, and I'm getting some sleep," she says.

But there are still enduring side effects. Jackson's memory is "still off" and still gets headaches and her sense of taste and smell suffered lasting damage. She doesn't drive far without someone with her because she's afraid of getting lost.

Audiology collaborates with College of Public Health

Starla Filippelli, Au.D, CCC-A, FAA, COHC, of the department's ENT & Audiology division collaborated with professor Chandran Achutan, Ph.D. to teach a course in UNMC's College of Public Health, ENV 909: Occupational Noise Exposure and Hearing Loss. This course will continue to be offered every other spring semester (year 2018, 2020) In this course, students will learn about the health effects, measurement, and control of occupational noise exposure, and emerging technology related to smartphones and hearing protection. The targeted audience include doctoral students interested in occupational health, professional students, and nursing students.

Upon completion of this course, students may take an external examination administered by the Council for the Accreditation of Occupational Hearing Conservationists (CAOHC) to earn the credential of "Certified Occupational Hearing Conservationist ICOHCI."

Drs. Achutan and Filippelli, have also implemented their knowledge from this course into the clinic. Audiology, 3rd Floor LOC, provides OSHA hearing screenings for the University of Nebraska Medical Center as well as Nebraska Medicine employees. This offers a resource for both UNMC and Nebraska Medicine to comply with OSHA standards, if any concerns of noise exposure arise in the workplace.


