

1970s[.]

The University of Nebraska Medical Center Family Medicine residency program was accredited and approved by the Board of Regents in 1970. Dr. Fay Smith, the first Professor of General Practice at UNMC, was instrumental in the start of the residency training program.

Leadership within the department included Dr. Francis Land, the first Chairman of the Family Medicine Department. During his chairmanship, the residency program expanded from four to 29 residents and a four faculty compliment.

Dr. Margaret Faithe served as Interim Chairwoman of the Department of Family Medicine in 1974. In 1975, Dr. Paul Young became the second Chairman of the Family Medicine Department and continued to lead growth and expansion in the faculty and residency program.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

Four residents made up the inaugural class. The residency program started with a goal to develop more primary physicians for the state of Nebraska, particularly in rural areas in need of health care manpower.

During the three years spent training, residents were responsible for the health care of approximately 25 families and ten chronic care patients. Residents had rotations in the emergency room, adult outpatient psychiatry, pediatric specialty clinics, medicine clinics, and obstetrics and gynecology. They also spent four months at a community hospital site in either Scottsbluff, Kearney, Friend or Crete.



The first graduates of the program stayed in rural Nebraska as practicing physicians and the department saw growth in the program from four residents to nearly forty residents in the span of a decade. Training went on to include a section in Behavioral Science to improve the Family Medicine residents' understanding and management skills of the emotional, behavioral, and social aspects of their patients and families. The Behavioral Science portion of residency education was largely supported by Bill Long, MD, and Jerry Authier, PhD.

Other sections included Community Health with opportunities to take courses covering epidemiology, medical computing, computer aided instruction, biomathematics, health care evaluation, and special

fostering relations with other health professionals.

MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The Department of Family Medicine offered variety of course options for College of Medicine students in the 1970s. Each senior student was required to spend four weeks in a family practice setting with options of extending their clerkship to eight or twelve weeks. The rural clerkship was a stable of the program starting early in the department's history. Medical student education was overseen by Dr. Margaret Faithe.

The Department also offered many elective courses. Students could participate in clerkships at the W Street Family Clinic, in an



emergency room at Methodist Hospital, take a course in Migratory Health in Gering, Nebraska, or pursue a research project.

Over the decade, curriculum changes included additional opportunities at Immanuel Hospital, Lincoln General Hospital, Lutheran Hospital, a course in Indian Medicine in Winnebago, and clinical experiences at Family Health Centers on Dodge Street and in South Omaha. Student could also take courses in Occupational Health Computer Aided Instruction and Agricultural Medicine.

The changes and course additions in the 1970s showed the growth in the department as the faculty and residency program expanded.

RESEARCH

Research did not play a big role in the department in the 1970s. No research was required for residents and scholarly activity was not an expectation or ACGME requirement until later in the department's history.

A REFLECTION ON THE 70s - DR. DENNIS GOESCHEL

I started my residency in 1974. Family Medicine, then known as Family Practice, was about 4-5 years old at UNMC. We had 15 residents in my class which included some of the most talented

undergraduate students from medical school. Dr. Francis Land was Chair when I applied but he left my first year. Dr. Margaret Faithe and Dr. Paul Young were the other Chairs during my three year residency. Having three Chairs in three years made it difficult to get to know any of them well, especially since many of my rotations were outside UNMC and University hospital.

Residency training and education have changed significantly. First of all, I started my residency clinic training in a trailer in south Omaha on "W" street. This was replaced a year or so later for a new clinic on "Q" Street. That was quite an upgrade. We had about eight full time faculty who basically staffed our clinics. Our inpatient training was outsourced. I did a two month rotation at Clarkson hospital with Ward and Wright. Back then, patients were admitted to the hospital for just about any reason, for example if they needed a barium enema. I was



paired with another resident and at times we would have up to one hundred patients to round on. I was on call about every fifth night for the entire hospital including the ICU, and this was my second rotation of the residency. Needless to say, at times I felt a bit shell-shocked.

We were also required to spend two months on an inpatient rotation with a family medicine group at Methodist hospital. The most memorable aspect of that rotation occurred when I was snowed in at Methodist from one of the worst blizzards in Omaha's history. Also during the second year we were required to spend four months in an outstate location. I went to Scottsbluff and it was one of the best educational experiences I had.

I eventually went there for private practice in 1977 and stayed for twelve years.

Our third year was all elective. I spent six months doing cardiology rotations and a month in the newborn I.C.U., and both rotations helped me greatly in private practice.

Although I had some very good clinical rotations, the education our current residents get is much better. Today's clinical faculty is much more diverse and specialized. When I was a resident there was very little to no emphasis on academic leadership



or scholarly pursuits. Inpatient teaching, which was nonexistent then from our faculty, is very good. A wide array of procedures are now taught that provide much needed service and convenience to rural Nebraskans.

The changes in facilities and education has been remarkable. I returned to our residency program in 1989, and the changes and innovations that have occurred under the leadership of Dr. Sitorius have kept the department ranked as one of the best in the country. I have no doubt Dr. Harrison will continue this legacy.

1980s

Dr. Margaret Faithe and Dr. Robert Bass served as Interim Chairwoman and Chairman in the 1980s. Department leadership also included the Executive Committee, made up of all committee chairmen and physician faculty, plus the Department administrator and the administrative assistant. Dr. Bass was appointed permanent Chairman of the department in February 1982.

The ever expanding residency program was headed by Dr. Daniel Halm for a majority of the 1980s. Dr. Jim Stageman took over program direction in 1988. In 1982, residency program graduate, Dr. Paul Paulman, took over Medical Student Education for Valgene Valgora, PA-C.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

In 1981, Dr. Bass oversaw the development of community based rotation for Family Medicine residents from the Family Medicine training programs at

UNMC, Creighton University, and Lincoln. Residents in their second or third year of training experience rural medicine first-hand during the two-month rotation. As part of its commitment to the rotation and to rural health, the Department connected various rural communities with UNMC through computer hookups. This effort, funded by the Department and the UNMC Library, included training in library and computer searching, communication skills, and the provision of library materials and services.

By 1982, the program had graduated 93 residents and over half had established practices in Nebraska. The faculty grew to a team of fifteen with more growth throughout the decade. Under the direction of Program Director, Dr. Daniel Halm, the need for teaching improvement was identified. Several faculty development workshops were held in clinical teaching, classroom teaching, and faculty contracts.


Dr. Michael Sitorius served as the chairman of Education Committee, setting up rotation and monitoring accreditation aspects of the program.

Technology advances gave residents a chance to train in library and computer searching, communication skills, and the provision of library materials and services. Other opportunities included a practice management program among regular rotation requirements. Residents

also shared teaching responsibilities to medical students assigned to rotations. Training continued in outstate rotations with sites hosted in Lexington, O'Neill and Beatrice.

In 1989, Family Medicine and General Internal Medicine began the join Primary Care Residency Program. Open to UNMC students only, it continues to offer the opportunity to specialize in Family Medicine or Internal Medicine at the conclusion of the PGY-1 Primary Care Internship year.

A Sports Medicine Fellowship, under the direction of Dr. Morris B. Mellion, was offered in conjuction with the Department of Orthopaedics. The program ran from 1989-1991.

MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The curriculum remained steady for the medical students interested in Family Medicine throughout the 1980s. An addition of a Sports Medicine elective for senior students in 1989 offered an outpatient

experience in three settings: sports medicine clinic, the sports rehabilitation unit at UNMC, and the athletic training room at the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

The Family Medicine Preceptorship, required for medical students, spanned across Nebraska with over 50 sites and more than 150 volunteer preceptors. The preceptorship shifted from a four week course to an eight week course starting in 1981, giving students broader opportunities to experience the scope of family medicine.



RESEARCH

Research was not an integral focus of the department in the 1980s though there was some interest and scholarly activity in sports medicine.

Associate Professor, Kashinath Patil, PhD, contributed to the department's scholarly activity and later the Kashinath Patil Award for Excellence in Research and Scholarly Activity was named for him.

A REFLECTION ON THE 80s - DR. TIMOTHY MALLOY

My residency training started in 1986 and I've always felt that I learned and grew more during that year than anytime in my life. There wasn't as much direct supervision in those days and that had some advantages as well as disadvantages. The concept of resident work hours didn't exist. Overnight call

rooms were shared, often among 2-3 residents with bunk beds, and without any gender distinctions. Obviously, that wouldn't fly today! There was only one program composed of 36 residents, twelve per year, and it was still called Family Practice.

The program director was Jim Stageman in his first year. The Department Chair was Bob Bass and the vice chairman was Mike Sitorius, who in the next few years became the chairman. These three were a big part of the of the teaching faculty along with Dan Halm, Doug Wheatley, Paul Paulman, Jeff Hill, Jeff Sussman, and Morris Mellion. The behavioral medicine team was headed by Jerry Authier. Jacqui Kreer did the lion's share of the social work education.

By the mid 80s, the majority of the hospital teaching service was now staffed by our own faculty. Our hospital service consisted of one



faculty attending, one supervising resident, and two interns who cared for an average census of 10-12 patients. It was a very good learning experience. There were three resident clinic sites, Harvey Oaks in west Omaha, in Bellevue, and at UNMC.

While it was possible to take elective rotations there wasn't as much opportunity because there were so many required rotations. Four months of OB (even if you knew were going into geriatrics), four months In Patient, 2 months rural...one thing that was not required was geriatrics and very few residents did it. I don't recall a procedures curriculum, I don't recall learning how to vasectomies, and colonoscopy was not being performed by family physicians. None of the faculty had C-sections privileges. So as you can see our faculty are much more diverse and specialized today. The program of today has much more to offer.

1990s

Dr. Michael Sitorius assumed the role of Chairman in 1990, after serving on the faculty since 1980 including roles as Vice Chair and Interim Chair of the Department. Dr. Sitorius would serve as chairman for


the next thirty years. With a change in leadership, the department also saw advances in the residency program.

The residency program was headed by Dr. Jim Stageman while Dr. Paul Paulman continued to lead to Medical Student Education program in the department.

The Department of Family Practice transitioned its name to Department of Family Medicine in 1996.

In 1998, Dr. Jeffrey Harrison was asked to oversee the Rural Training Track Residency program, taking over for Dr. Stageman. Layne Prest, PhD, served as the Director of Behavioral Medicine.

Family Medicine Associate Professor Jeffrey Hill, MD, served the College of Medicine as Assistant Dean for Admissions from 1995-1999 and Associate Dean for Admissions and Students from 1999 to his retirement in 2018.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

The UNMC Department of Family Medicine established the Rural Training Track (RTT) program in 1991. It was one of three family medicine residency training programs in the US to receive ACGME approval. Grand Island and Kearney were selected as training sites based on their role as regional referral centers serving substantial rural portions of the state.

In 1996, the RTT program expanded to Scottsbluff and North Platte, which served as regional referral centers for the western part of the state. It has since become a cornerstone of the Rural Health Education Network.

Another residency training track was established in 1992 when the Department added family practice residents from the United States Air Force. As a result of the merger, 17 residents from Ehrling Berquist Hospital became part of the UNMC program, providing the benefits of eight additional faculty and a new training site for several of our rotations such as orthopedics and surgery.



In 1993, the UNMC Department of Family Medicine developed the Advanced Rural Training Program which allows fourth-year medical students to complete their first year of residency in conjunction with their final year of medical school.

In 1999, the program also added the Urban Underserved training track in partnership with One World Community Health Centers. The Urban Underserved Residency Track is designed to train physicians to care for underserved urban populations and fluency in Spanish is required. The curriculum may include special rotations in community health, community pediatrics, and school health.

The educational experience of residents in the 1990s boasted an experienced faculty with more than 35 full-time members as well as two psychologists, a social worker, medical educator, health educator, dietian, pharmacist, two physician assistants and two researchers.

Opportunities to further education were available through grand rounds, conferences, seminars, and research programs. A flexible curriculum allowed residents to explore their interests.

The end of the 1990s meant the over 250 physicians graduated from the program, many going on to practice in rural Nebraska.

MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The Family Practice program relied on numerous physicians outside the Department to reach the education goals set for medical students and residents.

Physicians across the state served as volunteer faculty and participated in the preceptorship program to provide medical students with exposure to the world of medicine. Preceptors continue to be a large part of the Department's Medical Student Education curriculum.

One of the most significant parts of undergraduate education that faculty members participated in is the development and teaching of several of the key components of the Integrated Clinical Experience (ICE). Several

Family Practice faculty served as division directors in the program, with responsibility for the curriculum and much of the teaching in such areas as preventive medicine, patient interviewing skills, and behavioral aspects of medicine. Faculty members Dr. Jim Medder and Dr. Dave Steele were instrumental in the development of the ICE program. The program is ongoing today.

The Department also sponsored a Family Practice Club, now called the Family Medicine Interest Group, to foster interest among undergraduates. And for those undergraduate students in the College of Medicine desiring some exposure to international health, the Department coordinated a one-month rotation in Belize, Central America. Supported by the Alumni Association of the College of Medicine, the program provided


more than 20 students with the opportunity to experience first-hand the medical challenges of a third-world country.

The SHARING Clinic was opened in 1997 with the goal of providing primary health care to underprivileged populations in the Omaha area. The clinic was founded by a group of medical and nursing students under the guidance of Family Medicine faculty member, Dr. Jim Medder.

RESEARCH

Associate Professor, Benjamin Crabtree, PhD, served as Director of Research for the department for much of the 90s and Dr. Helen McIlvain, played a role in research with a focus in smoking cessation. She also had an interest in stress management and behavioral science. Associate Professor, David Steele, PhD, was the Director of Educational Research and Development.

In 1996, the department was awarded its first RO1 grant, with Dr. Crabtree serving as the principal investigator for "Prevention & Competing Demands in Primary Care Practice".

A REFLECTION ON THE 90s - DR. ELISABETH BACKER

My first connection with the department arose from a phone conversation with Mary-Ann Casey, the residency coordinator at the time. Little did I know that her kindness and guidance would become a beacon throughout the ensuing residency years, and that upon graduating, three further decades of rewarding work in our department would unfold.

The 1990s were marked by stately leadership; Dr. Maurer as Dean and later chancellor, Dr. Sitorius as chairman, Dr. Goeschel as vice-chairman, and Dr. Stageman as residency director. With a handful of

devoted faculty members, including Drs. Halm, Wheatley, Paulman, Abdouch, Hill, Malloy, Bowman, Fitzgibbons, Nasir, Matthews, Babbe and Smith, the Family Medicine Department truly felt like a closeknit family. Carol Enfield was Dr. Sitorius' secretary back then, and Roberta Gatch, alongside Linda Auger, were the administrators.

Inpatient rounds started around the old library table with donuts and coffee, Dr. Mark Goodwin (our supervising resident at the time) attempting to keep us all in line. Given the partnership with the Airforce program, my residency group included several distinguished and experienced flight surgeons, as well as a diverse group of international physicians, with representation from countries like Croatia, Vietnam, Afghanistan, Syria, Pakistan, Philippines, Egypt and South Africa. There was a main residency track, as well as a rural track, with residents transitioning to Grand Island or Kearney to complete their training. Residency Graduation Luncheons were held at Castle Barret, and Banquets at the Omaha Country Club. Vicki Hamm was responsible for overseeing the UNMC residencies. Dr. Wigton and Dr. Tape were the ACGME gurus.

Our department had several vital divisions. The behavioral health division included Dr. Robinson and Mary-Ann Manners and was led by Dr. Layne Prest. Dr. Bowman oversaw the rural division, and Dr. Steele the medical students. Dr. Crabtree inspired the research division as principal investigator of a RO1 grant. It was a great time to be involved in qualitative research alongside Drs. McIlvain, McVea, Minier, Robinson, Lacy and Jenenne Geske. We spent countless hours in analysis and writing of manuscripts, visited urban/suburban and rural practices, and presented posters and papers at many a NAPCRG and STFM meeting. Dr. Goeschel with his wise oversight and perspectives, kept the clinical division accountable.

Teaching Days were not as extensive, but even then, Dr. Dave O'Dell quizzed us relentlessly about EKG's! Grand Rounds were held in the Eppley Science Building, with frequent pharmaceutical displays and meals provided. Dr. Malloy ran the Geriatrics Program and together with Margaret Safranek, we would drive across the city visiting nursing homes and individual shut-ins, wearing Santa hats and singing carols during the holiday season. I recall regular lunch-and-learn meetings and academic discussion groups. There was no doubt that Dr. Stageman expected peak performance on our In-Service Training Exams! And while we may not have been promoting colonoscopies back then, Dr. Hill made sure we learnt how to do flexible sigmoidoscopies and colposcopies instead.

There were but a few clinics, namely the DOC, Harvey Oaks, Baker's Place and the Summit Plaza Clinics. I recall the first time I drove out to the Harvey Oaks Clinic in West Omaha. It felt like we had reached the very edge of town! EPIC did not exist. Paper charts held either handwritten SOAP notes or those transcribed from dictaphones. The Bellevue and Oakview Medical Centers had not yet been designed. Clarkson Hospital was still its own entity, with the Clarkson Family Residency Program

located just across the road. One World was called Sona. There were no Durham Research Towers, no Michael Sorrell Center, and no Transplant or Cancer Centers. And parking spots seemed plentiful!

While we had no regular MD business meetings to attend, we enjoyed wonderful Christmas Holiday Parties at the German American Society, with Dr. Wheatley jovially dressing up as Santa. I recall a departmental picnic or two at the NP Dodge Park, a somewhat competitive softball league and a recreational basketball league of sorts. And then there were those fun clinic parties, often held at Dr. Hill's or Dr. Goeschel's homes.

As I reflect back over almost 30 years, I feel immensely grateful and humbled to have shared in the history of our department. While dynamic and system-wide changes have certainly been inevitable, our department today stands as a testimony to those faculty and staff members who have faithfully upheld its core mission, and have done so with tremendous dignity, integrity and intentionality. As they pass on the baton to future faculty, residents and students, may their legacy live on for many generations to come! (With special acknowledgment to Marlene Hawver, another veteran staff member, who keeps excellent records).

2000s

Dr. Michael Sitorius continued as chairman throughout the 2000s celebrating ten years as chairman in 2000. In 2004, Dr. Jeffrey Harrison,

became the Director of Graduate Medical Education, overseeing the entire residency program.

In 2009, the department initiated a partnership with Tongji University for training family physicians and hosted visiting professors.

Many faculty members were named to leadership roles in the UNMC College of Medicine in the 2000s. Dr. Paul Paulman served as the Assistant Dean



for Clinical, Education, and Quality from 2007-2020. Dr. Jeffrey Harrison was named Assistant Dean for Admissions and Student Affairs from 2008-2017 and Associate Dean for Admission and from 2017-2020. Dr. Jim Stageman served as Assistant Dean for Graduate Medical Education within the College of Medicine. Dr. Jeffrey HIII served as Associate Dean for Admissions and Students for the College of Medicine beginning in 1999 and through the 2000s.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

The Rural Residency Training Track entered its ninth year in 2000 and added an additional training site in Norfolk, Nebraska with residents focusing on the delivery of family health care at Faith Regional Health Services and five different medical offices in the area.

The residency program was now home to five different training tracks – Traditional Training Track, Urban Underserved Track, Rural Training Track, Air Force Training Track, and the Advanced Rural Training Track.

The unique and significant contributions to teaching to the University of Nebraska education system lead to the department receiving the University-Wide Teaching Award in 2008.



MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The required clerkship continued to be a popular rotation for M3 students. The rotation in Nebraska's rural communities serve as an incomparable way for the student to observe the physician in their medical, ethical, and community relationships.

Family Medicine faculty were also integral in the medical student Integrated Clinical Experience (ICE)

program. The Integrated Clinical Experience (ICE) program is intended to help students recognize the

clinical relevance of basic sciences and to gain an appreciation of the social, psychological, and ethical dimensions of the practice of medicine.

The department's involvement in the SHARING clinic continues with many faculty members taking on leadership roles while helping develop future physicians. Past Presidents of the Faculty Advisor Committee included Dr. Jim Medder, Dr. Paul Paulman, Dr. Audrey Paulman, Dr. William Hay, and Dr. Jennifer Liu.

RESEARCH

Research began to take a more integral role in the development of the Department of Family Medicine in the 2000s. In 2000, Helen McIlvain, PhD, was named Director of the Research

Division for the department, often serving as co-investigator or principal investigator on faculty research grants in smoking cessation and primary care.

In 2003, the department was awarded its second ROI grant. Associate Professor, Dr. Kristine McVeigh was served as the principal investigator for "Teen counseling for smoking cessation."

Jenenne Geske, PhD, joined the faculty in 2001 as a research project coordinator, specializing in research and often serving as a research advisor for family medicine residents.

Other research endeavors included the Nebraska Area Health Education Centers. Through the Rural Health Education Network Office, UNMC applied for and received federal funding to establish Area Health Education Centers in Nebraska. UNMC received its first AHEC funding from the Division of State, Community and Public Health within the Bureau of Health Professions under the Health Resources and Service Administration in September 2001.

A REFLECTION ON THE 00s - DR. AMBER TYLER

The first decade of the new millennium was a decade of change for the Department of Family Medicine. My residency class began in 2003, just as the first-ever resident work hour restrictions were implemented. Residents were now limited to 30 hours in a shift (no new admissions after 24 hours, the last 6 hours were for finishing up duties from the previous 24 hours and handing off), with a minimum of 8 hours off after that shift. We could only work 80 hours per week, averaged over the 4 weeks of the month, and had to have a minimum of 4 days off per month. The represented a significant shift in the way the program conducted resident training. The first year saw a lot of changes in the logistics of how

we functioned on our inpatient service as well as how things went when we rotated on other services. As a result of the restrictions the mole month became a new rotation that allowed 2nd year residents their first taste of intern supervision and increased autonomy in decision-making. The mole month has persisted to present day.

Opportunities for electives were limited, and further decreased to only 2 with the addition of a mandatory practice management month for the military residents. This was a source frustration for the residents, which was acknowledged by Dr. Harrison, then program director. Working together, we merged the occupational medicine rotation into the July orientation month, allowing for the addition of another elective month. Though it did not benefit those of us already in the program, the residents of my cycle appreciated that our concerns were heard, and collaborative changes were made.

Further change came as the United States Air Force began to reshape

their medical services. We had spent a month on Labor and Delivery at Ehrling Bergquist Hospital as interns, until the unit closed at the end of April 2005. A few short months later at the end of August 2005, Ehrling Bergquist Hospital became Ehrling Bergquist clinic, ending our Family Medicine inpatient service there as well. While the loss of these educational opportunities was felt by all, they paved the way for the building of the Bellevue Medical Center a few years later, which provided us with even greater opportunities there.

While Ehrling Bergquist shrank, UNMC grew with the addition of Clarkson Hospital. In the early days that meant covering 2 EDs for admission, until Hixson-Lied was built and the EDs consolidated. Little did we know that the number of towers would double again in the next decade!

Residency is a time of high stress, uncertainty, and rapid learning I will always remember the supportive faculty that nurtured me. I will always hold dear my co-residents, who became family. I will always be grateful to the administrative support staff (Betty Van Cleve, Rita Smith, Marlene Hawver and all the rest) that kept us together and informed through it all. Above all, I remember a department full of people who adapted to change, who smiled and laughed together, and who genuinely cared.

2010s

The start of a new decade included honoring Michael Sitorius, MD, for serving as Chair of the Department of Family Medicine Chairman for 20 years. Dr. Sitorius continued to serve as chair until

2020 when the baton was passed to Dr. Jeffrey Harrison. During his time as chairman Dr. Sitorius initiated several key programs, including the Nebraska Area Health Education Center (AHEC), the Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) and the combined primary care residency program for family medicine and internal medicine. Under his leadership the department grew from 20 full-time faculty and 36 resident physicians to more than 50 full-time faculty and 68 residents.

Dr. Kimberly Jarzynka who joined the faculty in 2004, became the Resident Program Director in 2014. Dr. Harrison remained the Program Director of the Rural Training Track.

Dr. Paul Paulman stepped down as Medical Student Education Director in January of 2016 after serving in the position since 1984. Dr. Mindy Lacey, a faculty member and graduate of the department's residency program, assumed the role.

In 2013, a joint Department of Family Medicine was established to provide training of Family Medicine faculty members from Tongji University who will in turn provide Family Medicine training in China. Department faculty lead a family medicine/primary care symposium annually in Shanghai in collaboration with Tongji.

In 2016, the department, now consisting of more than 40 faculty members and more than 15 support staff, moved into the former Orthopedics area to make room for new cancer center.

GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

New teaching opportunities were presented to the program with the opening of Bellevue Medical Center in 2010. The additional campus increased leadership opportunities for Family Medicine faculty and learning opportunities in obstetrics,

inpatient, and procedural care for residents. Several new faculty members were introduced with the opening of the hospital and resident training also expanded to the additional family medicine clinic.

The Rural Training Track continued to be one of the oldest, largest, and most sustainable rural training tracks in the nation. In 2010, the department's program received a full five-year ACGME accreditation cycle which is nearly unheard of for rural track programs.

Jessica Koran-Scholl, PhD, joined the faculty as Associate Professor and



Director of Behavioral Health in 2012, directing Behavioral Medicine rotations for Family Medicine residents.

In 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2019 U.S. News & World Report ranked UNMC College of Medicine in the top ten of the nation's Best Primary Care Programs.

MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

The Family Medicine Interest Group, serving students in the UNMC College of Medicine, garnered recognition in 2014 when it received a national award from the American Academy of Family Physicians for professional development.

On April 21, 2015 the UNMC Curriculum Committee approved the reengineering of the College of Medicine curriculum. They accepted a three-phase concept proposed by the Curriculum Innovations Workgroup and agreed to create a task force to further refine the CIWG proposal. Over the next three years, more than 120 College of Medicine faculty worked on the development of the new curriculum.





RESEARCH

Since 2011, members of the faculty in the Department of Family Medicine have been contributing authors on nearly 60 publications. Topics are diverse and include medical education, rural health care, care of patients who are obese and care for geriatric patients. Family Medicine faculty have edited or contributed

to nearly a dozen books, participated in over 170 presentations at regional, national or international meetings and have received extramural grant support.

The first Resident Research Symposium was held in 2014. Each year, in their finally year of residents, Family Medicine house officers present a research project at the Annual Resident Research Symposium, held on the UNMC campus. The top presenters are recognized at the event attended by faculty, residents, and staff.



A REFLECTION ON THE 10s - DR. JASON MEREDITH

My initial exposure to the department came in the summer of 2010 when I arrived at Offutt to complete by M4 audition rotation. During that month, I spent time at main campus to get a feel for the inpatient and OB services. When I asked why I wasn't rotating at the new Bellevue Medical Center, I was told that it was not busy enough for a resident service, let alone a medical student (how things have changed). Speaking of things changing...the inpatient service at main campus was three teams consisting of faculty, upper-level resident, and 2 interns; each team took 24-hour in house call every third day.

Upon starting my residency training at UNMC, I walked into a training program that was scrambling on how to manage new ACGME work hours. Interns could only work 16 hours per day. It was a struggle that all programs across the country had to deal with, but what a mess. It felt weird working less as an intern than I did as a M3 or M4. We made the best out of it, but I am so happy that non-sense rule went away. Talk about NOT preparing folks for practice.....

During my residency training, Bellevue Medical Center became a bigger focus within the department. A thriving outpatient teaching clinic was created and has flourished. Today it is one of the busiest

clinics in the entire Nebraska Medicine enterprise. Bellevue became a strong, robust inpatient teaching service. The days of daily censuses in the single digits are now long gone. Early in the decade, much of the OB service shifted down there as well. As a military resident living in Bellevue, I did not mind this change in focus to BMC....I could take home call and take a quick 5 minute drive to go do a labor check or complete an overnight admission. Speaking of overnight admissions, most folks don't remember, but residents at one point were not required to come in for overnight admission after 2200 hours at Bellevue unless they were ICU level (which required the faculty to come in as well because there was no overnight critical care medicine support). We just put in tuck in orders and saw them first thing in the morning. Unfortunately, I was on the inpatient service the month that the policy changed....3 "pneumonia" admits that were actually NSTEMIs and STEMIs will do that. As much as I did not enjoy OB, the learning environment on the OB Labor Deck at BMC was incredible. Such a supportive, collaborative environment existed between the base OBs (Drs

Perfillio, Masters, and Snow), the FM OBs, and the cross-covering inpatient resident team. I learned so much that I completed the OB section on my initial family medicine boards to the surprise and amusement of all my faculty and co-residents.

Scholarly activity and research gained a foot hold in the department in the 2010s as well. The initial Resident Research Symposium took place in March 2011 during my last year of residency training. Considered a novelty at that time, it is now a regular and expected part of the academic calendar. Gone are the days of doing a 5 Minute Clinical Consult chapter edit and calling it resident research; now case posters presented at national conferences and original IRB approved research are the norm.

The 2010s also laid the foundation for the Sports Medicine prowess of our department. Drs. Hank Lau, Monty Mathews, and Nate Falk developed amazing curriculums, provided great sideline experiences, and mentored residents and medical student who had a passion for musculoskeletal problems in primary care. During the decade, 11 graduates from our residency program were selected for Sports Medicine Fellowship positions across the country. This foundation created the momentum for a Fellowship program within our program which hopefully will come to fruition within the near future. The 2010s also saw significant changes in the way we do resident education. Gone are the required OB numbers (40 vaginal deliveries and 10 continuity deliveries) that made getting the One World OB call schedule covered easy because we were all desperate for numbers. Resident work hours rules changed every 3 years (it felt like). Resident wellness became a firm priority. Teaching days evolved as well. Gone are half days of death by PowerPoint. Now active learning strategies are used so often that they are expected and go unnoticed. Despite all the changes, the residency continued to pump out fantastic graduates, many of whom I call coworkers today.

Speaking of change....have you seen the new Department of Family Medicine digs? If you haven't, you really need to stop by. Gone are the days of cramming 10 residents in a workroom smaller than Dr. Smith's wine cellar. No more sleeping on a squeaky recliner during overnight calls. Gone are the days of hoping the overnight custodian is not sleeping on the couch in the library when you just desperately want some place to take a quick nap. The new resident work room, multiple conference rooms, OB workroom, and upgraded faculty offices align with the importance that our department plays in the University.

As much as things change, they also stay the same. When I returned to the program as faculty, many of faculty who molded me remained and are still present today. Without Drs. Simmons, King, Free, Jarzynka, Harrison, Mathews, and Malloy; I would not be the physician, faculty, and person I am today. The Air Force faculty are getting to stay longer than 4 years now and some come over to the civilian side after paying their penance to the USAF. Because of the support of Department leadership, the residency program continues to be one of the best ones in the nation.

Our new decade has already brought additional challenges and required evolution in our department and residency program, but the more things change, the more they will stay the same. The most important asset of our department is the people. Our people's enthusiasm for medical student education, developing and mentoring residents, providing patient care that is second to none, and passion for looking out for each other will drive the continued success and growth as a department for years to come.




committed to slowing the spread of the virus and adjusted to a world of social distancing and mask wearing.


