International visitors resume with new iGlobal system



The Office of Global Engagement (OGE) is continuing to roll out iGlobal to UNMC. iGlobal is the University of Nebraska's international participant management system. It is utilized by all four NU campuses to track and maintain the records for all international students, scholars, and employees. This system will allow the OGE to be in compliance with Federal regulations while expanding services to UNMC. International students are already utilizing iGlobal for immigration services, including completing pre-arrival and onboarding requirements.

In mid-December, the OGE also unveiled a revamped International Visitor Registration for department administrators that streamlines the visitor registration process. Future enhancements will include applications H1-B and Permanent Residency sponsorships for new international faculty and staff, more online services for international students, and more.

The OGE will offer training on these dates on the new international visitor registration process through iGlobal. Click on a date to register. More trainings will be offered in the coming months.


Dr. Davies speaks at international forum
