

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NIH Policy Announcements

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As you'll recall, applications after Jan 25, 2023 needed to have a Data Management and Sharing Plan AND we needed to "pull out" those associated costs into a single budget line item. And we needed to explain those costs in the budget justification.

NIH updated that policy in July 2023, which impacted applications submitted after 10/04/23.



NIH Application Instruction Updates – Data Management and Sharing (DMS) Costs




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This was a mid-year update to the Jan 2022 NIH DMS Policy.

June and July NIH grants were not impacted, but Oct and Nov grants are/were.

- NIH will no longer require the use of the single DMS cost line item.
- DMS costs must be requested in the appropriate cost category, e.g., personnel, equipment, supplies.
- While the single cost line item is no longer required, NIH will require applicants to specify estimated DMS cost details within the "Budget Justification"

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Vendor vs. Suprecipient vs. Consultant



Subaward



- Other organization is intended to carry out a portion of the scope of work
- Typically includes collaboration on the project; both entities have PIs involved, though UNMC lead institution
- •Subawardee retains control of any intellectual property that they develop

Vendor



- Provides goods and/or services within normal business operations
- Provides similar goods and services to many different purchasers
- Operates in a competitive environment

Consultant



- Paid at fixed negotiated hourly rate
- Considered "work for hire"
 Intellectual property information is assigned to

Sub: an intellectual collaboration between co-equals

Vendor: sells goods/services in a competitive environment

Consultant: "WFH" independent contractor, hourly rate, may/may not be Sr/KP

We are going to focus on a few **specific** *roles* for NIH grants: **PI**, **co-I**, **OSC**, **Consultant**





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Glossary Time – Program Director/Principal Investigator



PD/PI

The individual(s) [with] the appropriate level of **authority and responsibility** to direct the project ...supported by the award. ... When multiple PD/PIs are named, each is responsible and accountable to their organization. The presence of more than one PD/PI on an application or award diminishes neither the responsibility nor the accountability of any individual PD/PI.

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Glossary Time – EEI and ESI



Early Established Investigator (EEI)

A Program Director / Principal Investigator (PD/PI) who is within 10 years of receiving their first substantial, independent competing NIH R01 equivalent research award as an Early Stage Investigator (ESI).

Early Stage Investigator (ESI)

A Program Director / Principal Investigator (PD/PI) who has completed their terminal research degree or end of post-graduate clinical training, whichever date is later, within the past 10 years and who has not previously competed successfully as PD/PI for a substantial NIH independent research award.

Glossary Time - MPI

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Multiple Program Director/Principal Investigator awards are ...multidisciplinary efforts and collaboration ...under a single grant award. All PD/PIs share equally the authority and responsibility for leading and directing the project, intellectually and logistically. Each PD/PI is responsible and accountable to their organization for the proper conduct of the project or program, including the submission of all required reports. The presence of more than one PD/PI on an application or award diminishes neither the responsibility nor the accountability of any individual PD/PI. Go to Multiple Principal Investigators.



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Glossary Time - Consultant



Consultant

An individual* who provides professional advice or services for a fee, but normally not as an employee of the engaging party. In unusual situations, an individual may be both a consultant and an employee of the same party, receiving compensation for some services as a consultant and for other work as a salaried employee. To prevent apparent or actual conflicts of interest, recipients and consultants must establish written guidelines indicating the conditions of payment of consulting fees.

*Consultants also include firms that provide professional advice or services. However, these entities are most often treated as *vendors* (as opposed to *subrecipients*). SPA <u>training here</u>.

Glossary Time – Other Sig. Contributor

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Individuals who have committed to contribute to the scientific development or execution of the project, but are not committing any specified measurable effort (i.e., person months) to the project. These individuals are typically presented at "effort of zero person months" or "as needed."



Individuals with measurable effort may not be listed as Other Significant Contributors (OSCs).





- ALL Sr/KP must have an eRA user ID.
- Dept Admins fill this out in Cayuse.
 And ADIS.

When to use "Other (Specify)" When the individual in question doesn't fit the other listed (in Cayuse/RR KP Expanded Form) project roles. When instructed to do so by the NOFO.

- - Mentors for trainee awards
- For all Other Significant Contributors
- Other times (ask SPA)

How many co-PIs can I have?



For NIH, the co-PI role does not exist.

Project Role:

Select a project role. Use "Other (Specify)" if the desired category is not available.

Special Instructions for Multiple PD/PIs: All PD/PIs must be assigned the "PD/PI" role, even those at organizations other than the applicant organization. The role of "Co-PD/PI" is not currently used by NIH or other PHS agencies to designate a multiple PD/PI application. In order to avoid confusion, do not use the role of "Co-PD/PI."

Neither does "collaborator."

Co-Investigator

An individual involved with the PD/PI in the scientific development or execution of a project. The Co-Investigator (collaborator) may be employed by, or be affiliated with, the applicant/recipient organization or another organization participating in the project under a consortium agreement. A Co-Investigator typically devotes a specified percentage of time to the project and is considered senior/key personnel. The designation of a Co-Investigator, if applicable, does not affect the PD/PI's roles and responsibilities as specified in the NIH Grants Policy Statement, nor is it a role implying multiple PD/PI.

NIH technically allows this, but there are stringent tests for when grant recipient institution F/S can serve as Consultants.

In addition, UNMC has even more stringent tests. Individual UNMC colleges have additional requirements.

LSS (long story short): This is rare, likely raises audit flags, is meant to be discouraged, and there may be a better way to accomplish what you're trying to do.

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What is an "Other Significant Contributor?"



Other Significant Contributor (OSC) is an individual ... committed to contribute to the scientific development or execution of the project, but has not committed any specified measurable effort (in person months) to the project.

These individuals are typically presented at "effort of zero person months" or "as needed" (individuals with measurable effort cannot be listed as OSCs).



Note on OSCs: For OSCs, enter "Other (Specify)" for the "Project Role" field, and enter "Other Significant Contributor" in the "Other Project Role Category" field.

Remember:

- Always Sr/KP
- Listed Last
- Need Biosketch
- · Need OS (for RPPR or adding new)
- Need eRA Credential



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NIH Grants: what's needed for OSCs?



Other Support? No

Biosketch? Always

Daily/hourly rate? Never

Re: budgeting: person months, calendar months effort? Never

Commons ID/eRA credential? Always always always always

Project Role

Select a project role. Use "Other (Specify)" if the desired category is not available.

Special Instructions for Multiple PD/PIs: All PD/PIs must be assigned the "PD/PI" role, even those at organizations other than the applicant organization. The role of "Co-PD/PI" is not currently used by NIH or other PHS agencies to designate a multiple PD/PI application. In order to avoid confusion, do not use the role of "Co-PD/PI."

Note on OSCs: For OSCs, enter "Other (Specify)" for the "Project Role" field, and enter "Other Significant Contributor" in the "Other Project Role Category" field.

What about Consultants?

Might or might not be Senior/Key Personnel:

it depends on what they are doing.

Examples:

- Hosting community events, organizing meetings, managing social media outreach – probably not Sr/KP.
- Analyzing data, contributing to publications, needed for their specific scientific expertise – probably S/KP.

<u>Take note</u>: If they're utilizing institutional resources, then <u>SUBRECIPIENT</u>.
